


Martin Murphy Awarded Community Service Award

One of this year's four Sheila and Victor Goldbloom Distinguished Community Service Awards was presented to a longtime ACRA Member, Martin Murphy. Our President, Norma Passaretti, proudly congratulated him on behalf of our members and Martin kindly shared some memories of his involvement in education and the service of others. "It is true that I loved the teaching profession. In 1962, when I started at Marymount, I joined the Federation of Englishspeaking Catholic Teachers and in November of that year, was elected Its Treasurer. There were two important moments that I recall with great pride: the first, as President of the Provincial Association of Catholic Teachers at the Teachers' Convention in November 1966, I spoke before 3,000 English Catholic Teachers in the new Palais des Congress at Place des Arts in the presence of Jean-Jacques Bertrand (later Premier); the second, in February 1967 when Raymond Laliberte, President of the CEQ, Anne MacLeish, President of PAPT, and I met Premier Daniel Johnson in Quebec City during the province-wide teachers' strike. We left his office with a return-to-work protocol agreement giving back 70% of income they lost during the five-week strike, plus a new salary scale. I remember the "Our Quest for Happiness" text in religion at Cardinal Newman when the late Msgr. Russell Breen taught us the chapter on social justice which evidently served us well! Waxing a little nostalgic!"

"Martin Murphy is known as the godfather of the Quebec Community Groups Network — and with reason. As the QCGN's first president, Murphy helped establish its current by-laws and structure. He has defended Quebec's English- speaking minority fiercely since the organization's inception in 1995." Source, QCGN awards booklet.

"As you may know, I was around the table in Lennoxville in 1994, now twenty-five years ago, when the first Agreement was signed between the English-Speaking



Minority Communities in Quebec as represented by QCGN, and the Federal Government. I have been quite active in that arena for most of the time ever since, including as President (2002-2005), while I was also Executive Director of the English Speaking Catholic Council where I worked for seventeen years after retirement from Baldwin Cartier School Board.....keeps the blood circulating! There are so many others, including yourself, who deserve special recognition for giving so generously in many forums over the years to improve the quality of life for all of us. It remains for me to tell you how honoured I am to receive your message as President of ACRA."

"A gentleman with unswerving commitment to service, Martin Murphy has long been a spirited and adroit advocate for social justice. Driven always by his strong sense of duty, he has advanced core community causes including better conditions for our teachers; greater access in English to our health and social services; and the successful conclusion of stormy negotiations with the federal government to ensure equitable funding. He has also quietly served as something of a godfather for the QCGN throughout its 24-year history. Murphy has proven particularly adept at keeping the development and vitality of our many smaller and more fragile **English-speaking** communities - dotted across Quebec's many regions at the forefront of our collective focus."
